The policy of BALTIC WOOD S.A. on sustainable use of forest resources pursuant to the directive of the EU and the Commission - EUTR

The Board of Baltic Wood S.A. introduces the policy of monitored harvesting of timber and timber-based materials, whereby it expresses willingness and obligation to accomplish the following objectives:

- ☛ Operation in accordance with FSC-STD-40-004 v3.1. standard, which will result in the preservation of the FSC certificate.
- ☛ Compliance with the requirements following from the regulations providing for the verification of the legality of timber origin.
- ☛ Procurement of timber and timber-derived products harvested exclusively pursuant to the laws of the countries of harvest, or in accordance with international law ratified by the countries in question.
- ☛ Continuing attempts to contribute to the growth of forest areas in the world, chiefly with a view to high conservation value forests and to bequeathing them in the best condition possible to future generations.

We meet the defined objectives by undertaking the following activities:

- ☛ Cooperation with suppliers who hold valid FSC certificates.
- ☛ Careful verification of Suppliers, aimed at increasing the number of purchasing possibilities and sources of certified materials with a view to thorough fulfilment of the orders placed by our Clients.
- ☛ Continuous verification of the EUTR requirements concerned with the duties of the operators placing timber and timber-based materials on the market, keeping all our suppliers informed of the above-mentioned requirements, HCVF forests-related requirements, as well as of the environmental and social benefits ensuing from certification.
- ☛ Rational management of the timber procured for the production of finished goods.
- ☛ Propagation of activities concerned with the protection of the natural environment.

Baltic Wood S.A. only purchases timber whose origin is known and allows an unequivocal exclusion of the following scenarios:

- ☛ Timber was obtained illegally, in defiance of the law of the country of origin.
- ☛ Timber was obtained from forest areas in which the laws involving local tradition and civil rights have been violated.
- ☛ Timber was obtained from forest areas which are endangered, and yet are not FSC-certified for high conservation value (HCVF).
- ☛ Timber was obtained from GM trees.
- ☛ Timber was obtained from a plantation established on the basis of natural forest.
- ☛ Timber is CITES-listed as endangered species - Appendix A and B, and the IUCN list, classified into the categories CE (Critically Endangered), EN (Endangered), VU (Vulnerable).
